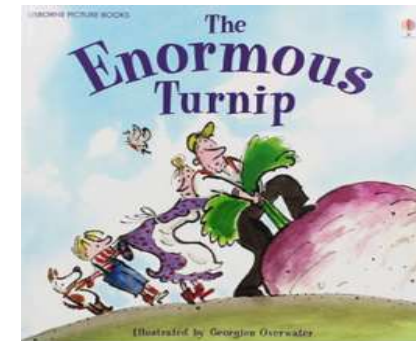
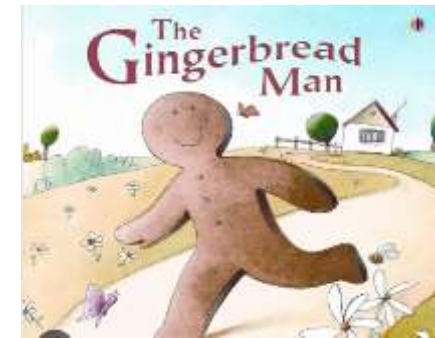
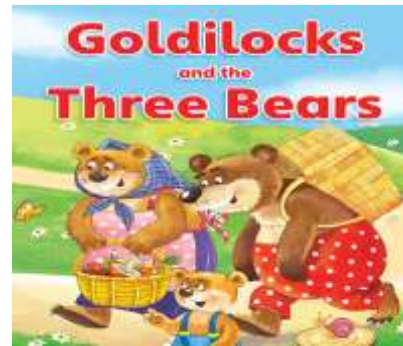


# Traditional Tales - Year R

Key Vocabulary	
<b>Traditional Tale</b>	A story that has been retold over many years. Sometimes called a fairy tale.
<b>Setting</b>	Where a story takes place, such as a castle, house or forest.
<b>Plot</b>	It describes the events that make up a story. There is often a sequence of events.
<b>Character</b>	A person or animal in a story.
<b>Hero</b>	The main character in a story. A hero is usually a character who is good in the story.
<b>Villain</b>	The character who is the opposite of the hero. The villain is often mean and does unkind things.

## Key Vocabulary

<b>Celebrate</b>	To enjoy a significant or happy day or event with a gathering of friends or family or to take part in an enjoyable activity.
<b>Religion</b>	A set of beliefs about how the universe was made and what its purpose is. Religion usually involves worship of a god or gods, and the belief in certain ideas about right and wrong behaviour.
<b>Eid-Al-Fitr</b>	Celebrated by Muslims to celebrate the end of Ramadan.
<b>Christmas</b>	Celebration of the birth of Jesus celebrated by Christians.
<b>Diwali</b>	Festival of light celebrated by Hindus and Sikhs.
<b>Birthday</b>	Celebration that takes place every year to celebrate the day someone was born.



During some celebrations, people decorate their houses with sparkly lights, candles and lanterns.



Special foods and meals are often eaten during celebrations, such as samosas and mince pies.



People may give gifts or wear special clothes during some celebrations.
